#### Some Words on Waiting

Most mornings, I get up early, and go out into the backyard with my dog. This time of year, its dark, being well before dawn. Last week, I got bundled up, and headed out the door. I was surprised to find that very dense fog had descended. It was very dark, and cold. But though it was dark, strangely, the fog made everything look a little bit white at the same time- very surreal.

All the familiar things in the yard looked foreign and blurry and strange. It was hard to see where to step- I couldn't see the path. It felt foreboding and lonely. I thought of going inside because it was uncomfortable here.

But, I decided to stay there for a while.

As I took some breaths and settled into it, I realized how utterly quiet and still it was. Usually, there is noise at my house, even in the middle of the night (industrial Park, freeway, people moving about). But right then, because of the fog, it was peaceful, and still-kind of otherworldly.

It felt like liminal space is a space between spaces, physical space or time — a threshold between what was and what is next. It's the space that we are in when we are waiting-neither where we were, or where we will be.

We all wait a lot.

Sometimes waiting is joyful. Think of children waiting for Santa, or waiting to hear for the key in the lock as a loved one comes in. I had 9 months of joyous waiting for my beloved Sam to be born. Most of the time, though, waiting is hard-we don't like it. We're undone by the process of un-knowing, pressure to be elsewhere, doing something else. We hurry to get to the next thing, to be better, to do better. We don't like the liminal space of waiting.

There is the everyday annoying waiting, like the check out line, being on hold on the phone, etc. But there is also a deeper waiting that we do sometimes - waiting that often accompanies difficult times in our lives.

We've all been through almost 3 years of hard waiting during the pandemic. We've waited to be able to go out, to be with loved ones, waited for loved ones or ourselves to get well, for things 'back to normal'. I'm STILL waiting for that!

Many of us have been waiting around health concerns. I recently had Covid. I uncomfortably waited to feel better, and for the test to say 'negative'. Others of us have been waiting to find out if treatments have worked, some are waiting for recovery.

Others are waiting through grief. We're waiting to feel relief from the pain and loss, waiting to feel OK again. And there is hard waiting at the end of life. In my work as an end of life doula, I sit with people waiting to die. And I sit with people going through the most agonizing waiting, listening fo that last breath of a loved one.

In times like these, we wait ...we wait.

We wait for the light.

We wait for relief.

We wait for God to show up.

Although there is much pressure to move out of the waiting in these situations, to hurry to feel better - consider these questions:

What growth, what mystery might we encounter if we have the courage to stay in the stillness, in the dark for a bit? What might happen if we settle into the liminal space, like the foggy night - being neither where we were before, nor striving to be where we will go, and just listen to the quiet, and just being present.

Might you hear your own heart beating, connect to your own soul's wisdom?

Might you hear Spirit whispering to you? Might you feel that God is holding you through the dark? The waiting, liminal space is a good place to just sit, in the presence, and in the quiet- it is a holy space.
