I have been blessed with many dear friends over my lifetime. The ones that have meant the most to me have been the friendships I have developed while creating and participating together in Worship. One of my very best friends is Betty Metzger, a piano player extraordinaire, who has been playing for Galt UMC on occasion this past year. It is our hope that she will play for us even more often and – so exciting! – start to offer rehearsals following worship on Sunday mornings for people who would like to sing at a future worship. I came to know Betty when I was appointed as Senior Pastor at Foothills UMC in Rescue, CA. She was the accompanist to our large and talented

choir, and when the choir director stepped down, she stepped up! We spent three glorious years meeting weekly to plan for worship, and together exploring the meaning of the seasons of the Church year. Because our friendship was based on our professional connection, I wasn't sure it would translate outside of Church. But when my husband Boikanyo was diagnosed with cancer, then passed away, and I was adrift emotionally and spiritually, it was Betty who took a long walk with me every week as I processed my grief, my worries for my children, and my emerging identity as a widow and pastor without a local Church. Betty Metzger was my trusted companion as the Holy Spirit shaped my new life and has remained so in the 20 years since.

Imagine my joy when Betty said YES when I asked if she might be interested in playing at Galt UMC from time to time. She lives over an hour away, so I knew it was a big ask, and her husband, Chris, has had many health challenges. In her time with us she has grown to love all of you at Galt UMC (as I knew she would!) and would like to play a larger role in developing our post pandemic music program. Her hope is that she can begin to be with us two or three Sundays a month! I am beyond grateful to the Lord for allowing my life to come full circle in appointing me to Galt UMC with my bestest pal within driving distance!

<u>The Work of the Church – How Our</u> <u>Church Works by Pastor Mary</u>

Probably the most significant thing that sets United Methodists apart from most other Christian churches, is our understanding and application of Scripture. In our United Methodist

Book of Discipline, which sets forth the theology and rules that govern our lives as Methodist Christians, it is written: Through Scripture the living Christ meets us in the experience of redeeming grace. We are convinced that Jesus Christ is the living Word of God in our midst who we trust in life and death. The biblical authors, illumined by the Holy Spirit, bear witness that in Christ the world is reconciled to God. The key phrase is *illumined by the Holy Spirit*. What that means is that Methodists believe that the Word of God – Jesus Christ -- is revealed through the words of human beings inspired by the Holy Spirit. As you can imagine, this impacts how we study and apply Scripture. More on that next week.
