The Work of the Church – How Our Church Works by Pastor Mary

Last week I promised that I would share my theological and Scriptural reasons for wanting the United Methodist Church to remove all institutional barriers to the full inclusion of people from all sexual orientations. What I thought I would start with are some excerpts

from a correspondence that I had with a theologically conservative colleague of mine. I will share portions of these letters over the next several weeks.

Because I came to Christ through Scripture and the Holy Spirit, so had as Christian role models the men and women of the Bible, I took very seriously the ethical and moral demands of discipleship. It was something of a shock for me as a young adult to meet Christians who didn't know Scripture and were little interested in knowing the stories and teachings of our faith. To this day I am obsessed with the Holy Bible. My greatest joy is in spending time soaking up its teachings and stories. This being the case, I am flabbergasted that of all the things that The Book of Discipline could emphasize as "incompatible with Christian teaching" homosexuality is the one! Seems to me that outside of the cultural and political reasons for its selection, the only other possible reason is because it represents "easy purity" – which is to say a behavior or identity that is visible in another and either is or isn't true. When I reflect upon the teachings of our Lord and the rest of the New *Testament Scripture, and take the world out of the equation,* I arrive at a much messier standard that could get any number of us bounced from ordained ministry: judgement is incompatible with Christian teaching; materialism is incompatible with Christian teaching; and so forth.... In some very important ways I am more spiritually equipped for ministry because of the ways I have wrestled with the parts of my heart, soul, and behavior that have been (and are) incompatible with Christian teachings. Through this wrestling with judgment and materialism I have learned to depend on God's grace alone.

Donkey brings chaos to Palm Sunday Service

Rev. Paul Lintern of Oakland Lutheran and Southside Christian Churches in Mansfield, OH, follows the ongoing adventures of mythical Pastor Jeff Mutton of Good Lord Community Church.



He will never forget the sight. It will go

down forever in the church history as the year of the donkey.

It will go down in Jeff Mutton's mind as the year he was an...



"Don't you have a donkey?" Jeff asked Pastor Dale near the beginning of Lent.

"Sure. Ol' Jack," Dale replied. "Gentle, calm, best donkey I've ever had."

"Do you think he could carry someone down the aisle on Palm Sunday?" Jeff asked.

"Sure, Jack would do anything for me," Dale smiled.

The Sunday before Resurrection Sunday was the Lenten equivalent of the Christmas pageant at Good Lord Community Church, ever since Pastor Mutton had arrived there 15 years ago. It included children, choirs, palms, decorations, parade, instruments - - everything that could project hosannas.

Maundy Thursday was a special communion service. Good Friday featured the Tenebrae of focus on the seven words of Jesus from the cross. Sunday morning pulled out all the stops for the resurrection.

Palm Sunday was the big production.

Years past had featured robes and palm branches and a 30-something bearded, long-haired member of the Sunday school committee to walk in humbly down the center aisle, with children fore and aft. Always on the verge of chaos, it was mostly on the cusp of festive, a great departure for these folks who otherwise never raised their hands in worship.

Then came the year of the donkey. Jack arrived just as promised in time for an entry through the foyer, covered on back with cloaks and carrying Dave, the new Sunday school superintendent. Three children in front were in charge of feeding carrots to Jack to entice him forward. Everyone seemed thrilled to see the parade and some were bragging that this was just like the big church in Columbus that walks camels down their aisle at Christmas.

But then, Jack decided he wanted all the carrots in the children's baskets, and his big teeth frightened 10-year-old Sophie, who started running up the aisle, causing Jack to become a racehorse and children to start screaming from fear of being trampled by a herd of one.

The commotion, the braying, the screaming, the overturning of the table of handbells up front and the fact that Dave had been thrown off Jack's back into the laps of the Krendler sisters (who were vehemently opposed to Pastor Mutton's church shenanigans anyway), was bad enough, but then what Jack did to the carpet up front, which then caused panic among the children and for several of the tender ones to throw up from the sight and smell, turned the parade into the most memorable church service there in, well, memory.

Dale had many reasons why Jack had not performed as planned — too many carrots, too many children, fear of palms branches, nervous intestines — but the time it took to get Jack out of the front of the church, for the children to go to the assembly room (without stepping in anything) and for the property committee to clean, the altar guild to restore and the handbell choir to recover, left no time for an actual worship service.

"Well, at least you completed one part of that story today," Jeff's wife said when they finally got in the car to go home, Jeff looked at her with a skeptical expression.

"You cleared the temple," she said.

Seven Words from the Cross

outline of sermon given by Pastor Mary, March 19

Forgiveness: Luke 23:32-34

Jesus's whole life and ministry have been a widening circle of forgiveness. As He suffers on the cross, He forgives those who are causing His suffering. Forgiveness for those who know not what they do. Forgiveness for those of us who DO KNOW the wrong that we do. Christ died that we might be fully and finally forgiven. He died to set us free.

Salvation: Luke 23:35-43 Jesus suffered, and the criminals beside Him suffered. Through the eyes of newborn faith, one criminal asked for mercy. There would be no time to show the world he was a changed man. Is a change of heart enough? Jesus's answer is YES: a changed heart brings salvation for the soul.

Love: John 19:25-27 *At the last the Lord was a good son,* not just in showing obedience to His Father in Heaven, but to His Mother whose heart was broken by His suffering. He provided for His Mother by giving her the Beloved Disciple to love and be loved by.

<u>Atonement</u>: Mark 15:33-34 Sin is separation from God. In order to take on the sins of humanity, our Lord had to know God's absence. Jesus Christ, God's Son, our Savior, was abandoned by God so that we never will be.

Suffering: John 19:28-29 Emotional suffering in seeing His mother's pain. Spiritual suffering in feeling the absence of God. Now the Lord Jesus Christ is in physical agony. He is given vinegar for His thirst in order to fulfill the prophecy of Psalm 69.

<u>Victory</u>: John 19:30 It is finished. Finished. Complete. Perfect. The Lord's mission was over. He had run the race God set before Him and crossed the finish line, the victory won. With His victory over sin, Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior made victory available to all of us.

Hope: Luke 23:46 Seven words from the Cross. Seven words that reflect the meaning of Christ's life and death. Jesus cries out to God and says, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." We live in hope because we know that His Father will receive His Son's Spirit and return it to us on Pentecost as the Holy Spirit, that power from on high that equips us to be all that Christ as called us to be as His disciples.
